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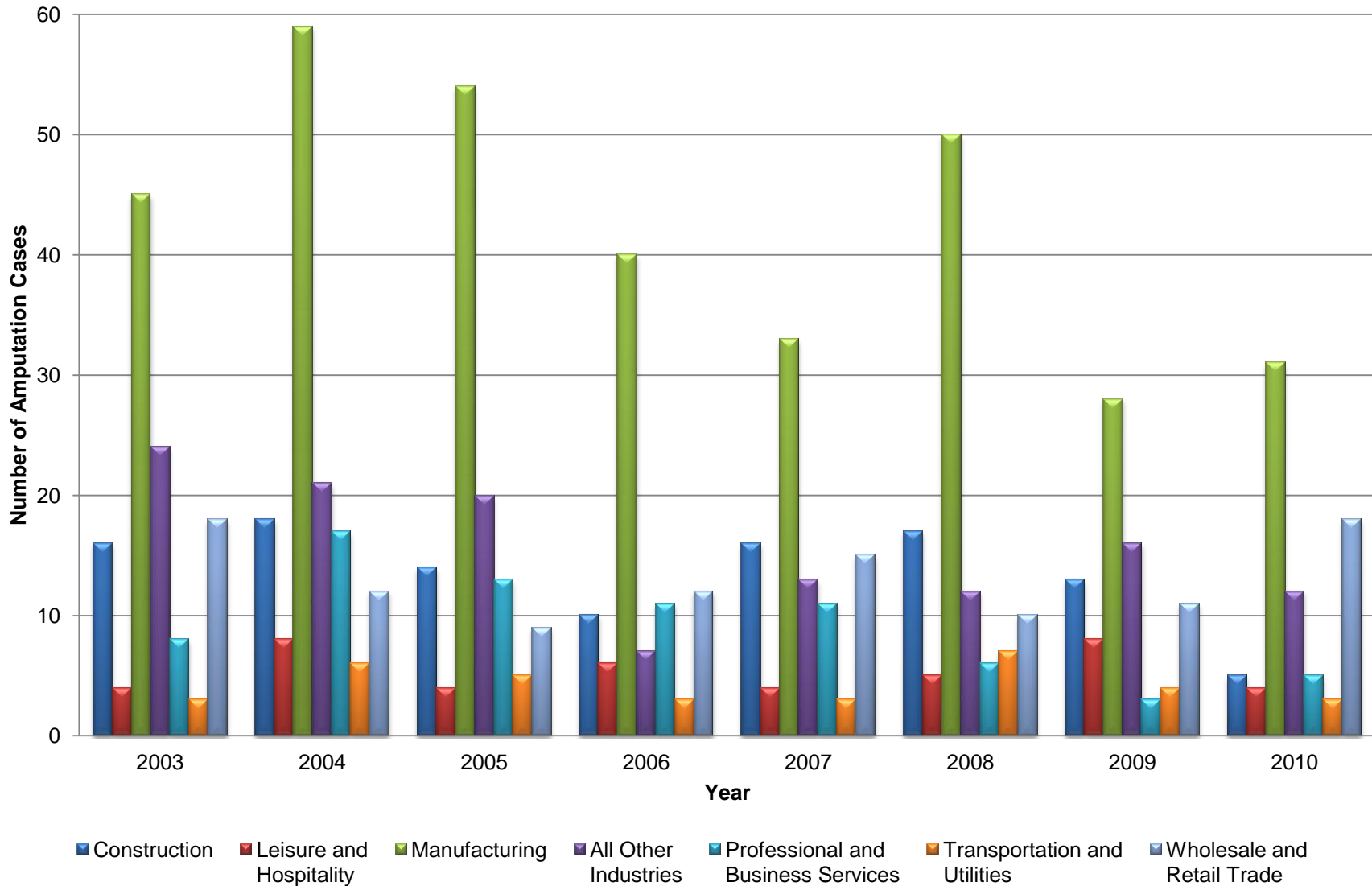

Data Notes:

- Data obtained from the Missouri Department of Labor - Department of Workers' Compensation
- In order to qualify as having lost work-time, an employee must miss more than 3 days of work due to an injury
- Counts based off of small cell counts of 0, 1, 2, 3, and 4 have been suppressed to protect patient confidentiality. In some cases secondary suppression was used to suppress rates based on cell counts >4 to prevent reverse calculation of totals to identify small cell counts
- Workers' compensation eligibility criteria and availability of data from workers' compensation programs varies among states, prohibiting state-level data from being directly compared to other states or with national estimates
